



1 Beaver trap, over time beavers have become smaller, this trap would have served well with one of the large ones of the past.

2 Laundry tongs were often used to protect the hands from the harsh chemicals and scalding water used in doing the laundry.






3 Pillow fluff-er beat the pillow back to a fluffy state for a clean comfortable sleep.


4 Jelly/soup strainer handy for making a smooth non lumpy sauce or jelly.






5 Spice box and grater this handy tin box helps keep spices fresh and has a handy grater at the ready to add fresh herbs and spices to any scrumptious meal.


6 Flower frog shaped as a turtle when used in a see through glass vase added a touch of elegance and a great talking point to the flower arrangement.






7 Medication syringe used to easily insert pills in a cows throat.



10 Shutter dogs outside most homes shutters were either decorations or practical to shelter the home from storms the dogs served to lock the shutters either open or closed depending on the weather.










13 Bridle Medallion often just as ornamental but frequently thought as good luck when out riding one might have a favorite medallion.
